Introduction

Master of Divinity (MDiv; 116 credits required; with seven non-credit courses, including Greek and Hebrew, the total is 130 credits; see below)

The Master of Divinity degree is ARTS central degree program. It seeks to integrate theory and practice to prepare graduates for pastoral ministry. It is the standard graduate seminary degree world-wide for training pastors. It is offered for ordained pastors and for students who plan to enter the ordained gospel ministry as a life calling. It is the most demanding and comprehensive of the ARTS degree programs. It requires 40 credits more than the MATS degree programs and 44 credits more than the MABC program. The MDiv program while involving more courses, can be completed in the same time as the shorter degrees. It simply requires a greater amount of work. The MDiv is especially designed to prepare men for effective pastoral ministry in the local church, enabling the development and shepherding of healthy, God-centered, Christ-exalting, Bible-soaked, world missions-mobilizing, evangelism-passionate and good-deed-zealous worshipping communities. This degree equips pastors to understand and to interpret the Scriptures in order to properly handle and preach the Word and to build up Christ's church. Each book of the Bible is studied in the curriculum and some books in great depth. It also entails significant study of Greek, Hebrew, systematic theology, historical theology, biblical counseling, world missions, practical theology and preaching.

The MDiv degree prepares men for various ordained and pastoral church ministries (preaching, prayer, teaching, pastoral leadership, church planting, evangelism, biblical counseling and world missions) and both men and women for various spheres of service both inside and outside of the church (e.g. education, administration, counseling, government, business, industry and development). The overall goal of the program is to equip leaders and especially pastors for gospel-driven ministry through biblical and Christ-exalting churches.

Africa Reformation Theological Seminary offers two tracks in the Master of Divinity program, an ordination track and a non-ordination track. The ordination track, in accordance with the historical theological position held by the mainstream of evangelical churches, is limited to male students already ordained as pastors or preparing for ordination. The non-ordination track is intended for both male and female students desiring to develop exegetical skills and a broader set of ministry skills for a variety of church, society and NGO ministries.

The Master of Divinity degree and the Master of Arts in Biblical Counseling (MABC) degree may both be earned by the same student. ARTS does not grant any other combination of two degrees. Either the MABC or the MDiv degree may be earned first. The student desiring to earn both degrees will be advised to finish one degree before being admitted to the second degree program.

Required time is 3.0 years for a full-time student to complete the MDiv degree. Sixty-four (64) courses are required including seven (7) non-credit courses. A student has the option of "testing out" of these seven courses (Greek I, II, III, Hebrew I, II and III and CT010 Computer Applications in Research), by passing competency examinations. In addition four non-credit mentored internships (involving supervised ministry practicums) are required.

Bridging Module

These three courses are offered to students who do not meet the Greek entry requirement. A student has the option of "testing out" of Greek I, II and III, i.e. passing a Greek competency examination in place of enrolling in and passing the three Greek courses. The bridging module is 19 days of classwork.

Award of a Postgraduate Diploma (PGD) in Divinity

Students who have successfully completed the first and second year courses and earned at least 60 credit units and who for any reason wish to terminate their studies may be awarded a postgraduate diploma in Divinity (PGC). Such students shall be required to undertake an industrial attachment and write a report. To qualify for the award of a PGD, students must have earned a CGPA of no less than 3.0.

Year 3 Semester 1

Having completed approximately one-half of the courses in the MDiv degree, students will draw upon material learned during the first two years of study as a foundation to increase preparation, skill, and effectiveness in the mentored internship experience. Mentored internships may occur between semesters but may also be accomplished during the semester.

- **PT3215 Denominational Studies (RPCU)** Reformed Presbyterian Church in Uganda: History, Polity, and Ordination; under ordination, this course includes a section on the procedures and preparation for licensure and ordination in RPCU presbyteries;
- **PT3215 Denominational Studies (AEPC)** African Evangelical Presbyterian Church: History, Polity, and Ordination: under ordination this course includes a section on the procedures and preparation for licensure and ordination in AEPC presbyteries;
- PT3215 Denominational Studies (COU) Church of Uganda (Anglican): History, Polity, and Ordination; under ordination this course includes a section on the procedures and preparation for licensure and ordination in the COU;
- **PT3215 Denominational Studies (PAG)** Pentecostal Assembly of God Church: History, Polity, and Ordination; under ordination this course includes a section on the procedures and preparation for licensure and ordination in the PAG;
- **PT3215 Denominational Studies (Denomination or Church name of which the student is a member)** A student from another church or denomination will study and write on the history, polity, and ordination procedures and preparation of their church.

PT2215 Research Methodologies (2)

PT3216 Master of Divinity Project (4)

This course is designed as the concluding and culminating course of the MDiv program. This course does not require classroom lectures. In this course, the student is required to: (1) write a confession of faith stating the student's theological beliefs (6–12 pages); and (2) complete the "Project and Project Paper," which is a faculty-supervised independent study, reflection, and research project on a topic that addresses the practice of biblical ministry in a church-based or church-building setting. The topic is selected by the student and approved by the supervisor. See the course syllabus and assignments for details.

Ordination and non-ordination tracks

The above 64 courses (57 are for credit) comprise the ordination track for men pursuing pastoral ordination or for ordained pastors seeking further training. The non-ordination track substitutes three courses for the three preaching courses and one course for PT3215 Denominational Studies as approved by the Academic Dean.

PT3001-3020 Mentored Internships

Four (4) non-credit **Mentored Internships** (rated at 2 credits each) are required for the MDiv degree. Mentored Internships will be done in the following ministry areas: teaching, evangelism, campus ministry, cell group ministry, children's and youth ministry, preaching, the practice of church government, counseling, church planting, discipling and educational ministries, worship and music, women's ministry, mercy ministry, biblical worldview and justice ministry, and other areas as approved by the Dean.

Total required courses: 64 (57 are credit courses and 7 courses, Greek I, II, III, Hebrew I, II and III and CT010 Computer Applications in Research, are required, non-credit courses)

Total required credits: 116 (with the 7 non-credit required courses, Greek I, II and III, Hebrew I, II and III and CT0101, the total is 130 credits)
